Presbyterian Women takes on children's education and literacy

Last fall, at the first Churchwide Coordinating Team meeting of the 2015–2018 triennium, CCT members agreed to make children's education a focus of PW's work during this triennium. Children's nurture and wellbeing have always been concerns of Presbyterian Women, but they are more so now, since the PC(USA) has launched a global/national campaign to strengthen quality education for a million children by 2020. Now is the time to think about how you and your PW group can support this priority. One way is to participate in the second set of **Together in Action Days** for 2016, **May 2–8**, focused on **children's literacy**. Because many peace and justice issues—poverty, discrimination, abuse, violence, exploitation, marginalization, imprisonment, unequal access to opportunity—are related to lack of education, Presbyterian Women's Churchwide Coordinating Team urges each PW group to join the church's education effort and devote PW's next Together in Action Days to empowering children through literacy. These days coincide with Children's Book Week, the longest-running national literacy initiative in the country. Learn more at www.bookweekonline.com.

Work for a better future by working with children

What better way to witness to the promise of God's realm than to meet the needs of children as they are developing? Children are the most vulnerable, easily exploited members of society. When they are neglected and abused, they often grow up to repeat the cycle of neglect and abuse. When their needs for nutrition and nurture are not met, they don't learn as well; they may have emotional and social disorders, will be less likely to function effectively, and will more likely end up at the margins of society, without education, and at a disadvantage in terms of competing for work that sustains self and family.

The power of words

Words and language are critical shapers of a child's future. Dana Suskind, a surgeon who does cochlear implants, has found important data on language acquisition.² She has found that, among her patients, "The kids who received cochlear implants but struggled to develop language often did so because their parents didn't talk to them as

much as their growing brains required." She references a study by Betty Hart and Todd Risley, "where they followed a group of children between 0 and 3 years old from all socioeconomic backgrounds.... [T]hey found, by the end of age 3, children from low-socioeconomic backgrounds will have heard 30 million fewer words than their more affluent peers.... The most stark findings of Hart and Risley were really the differences in affirmations versus prohibitions.... Not only does that impact children's language development, but it can often be related to toxic stress, which impacts children's ability to learn, as well as their own view of themselves.... We want to see a shift, where ... every parent, every caregiver, every educator, every policymaker understands how powerful language is in allowing every child to reach their genetic, intellectual potential."

Plan a day or week of service for PDA mission

In a recent newsletter, we told you about Louisville's Mayor's Week of Service, held each spring, and what PW in the Mid-Kentucky Presbytery are doing in response.

Each year, Louisville Mayor Greg Fisher encourages Louisville citizens to volunteer acts of compassion during a designated week in April. Individuals, churches, businesses and schools choose projects to benefit the community and people in need. In fact, PW and PC(USA) employees participate in this week of service! In 2015, projects included:

- Operation Brightside trash clean-up
- Bears on Patrol (stuffed animals in police cars for children in trauma)
- Shoe collection to raise money for clean water projects
- Habitat for Humanity housing
- Little Free Libraries in underserved neighborhoods
- Sorting medical supplies for overseas recipients

PW of Mid-Kentucky's idea for 2016

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PW in the Mid-Kentucky Presbytery is asking PC(USA) churches in metro Louisville to assemble items and pack hygiene kits for Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) (see ad at right for additional information on kits). Members of congregations will donate the items that go into the kits, PDA will cover the cost of shipping the kits to Arkansas (Ferncliff Disaster Assistance Center). The center has a covenant relationship with Church World Service (CWS) and PDA. The warehouse is one of two centers designated to receive CWS Gift of the Heart kits from churches around the country. Here is information that was sent to churches in the Presbytery of Mid-Kentucky about the presbytery's day of service.

Ways churches and PW groups can participate

- Pray for people struggling to survive a disaster.
- Recruit volunteers at each church.
- Buy items for one kit, several kits or shipping boxes.
- Send teams of five to ten people to kit assembling events.
- Teach a Sunday School class about Presbyterian Disaster Assistance. Video, pamphlets and speakers are available.
- Contribute money to buy needed items.
- Designate PW gathering offerings for the project. Or bring completed kits and items for kits to meetings.
- Invite young people to bring items for kits to youth events.
- Invite the church's preschool students/families to donate.
- If a church cannot send a team to an assembling event, they can make hygiene kits at their own church.
- Bible study groups, men's breakfast circles, preschool students, choirs, youth groups, etc., can donate items.
- A church can designate a Give a Day event to promote the PDA program and launch participation in this service.
- Seminary and college students can assemble kits on campus or at a presbytery assembling event.
- Families can adopt this project, making one or several kits.

Expected outcomes

People receive the tangible help they need following a disaster. Presbyterians fellowship together as they assemble and pack hygiene kits. Children, teens, adults, and seniors act out their Christian faith together. Preschool students learn to do mission. Everyone in every church contributes to and participates in this project.

PDA encourages PW groups to participate in the ecumenical Gift of the Heart Kits program. Hygiene, baby care, clean-up and school supply kits offer a way to reach disaster survivors and others in need with the hope of Christ. Together in Service

Mission Magnified: A gathering worth repeating

Mission Magnified was put on by PC(USA) World Mission, November 19– 21, 2015, in Kansas City, to train leaders of shortterm mission trips. But it was so much more. It was a jam-packed three days of information and tool sharing that anyone associated with any mission trip,

even a one-day project, should go through.

Topics were presented in a relaxed lecture format with smallgroup discussions following each session. While each session was valuable on its own, each one built upon the previous.

In the first session we were introduced to the six core values of mission involvement—dignity, empowerment, holistic ministry, partnership, relevance to God's world and stewardship. As we went through case studies, we judged each one by how well it met the core values. Participants shared personal mission experiences and discussed how they met core values. Some did, but many fell short.

We viewed Simon Sinek's video *Start with Why*, which says most people plan missions starting with the *what*, then the how and finally the *why*. Sinek says we should start with an honest look at *why*, then how and finish with *what*. When you look at mission projects this way, you might rethink them.

Those three days changed my own approach to mission projects. When the program is presented again, I encourage anyone at all interested in influencing your group's mission work to attend, as I will do again.

Working from the grassroots up to end human trafficking, reach children in danger of being left behind

PW and Educate a Child

Want to work for justice and peace at the most fundamental level? Work with children, the most vulnerable and easily exploited members of society. Help shape a more just and peaceful future by investing time in their development.

Presbyterian Women is taking a leadership role in supporting the PC(USA)'s Educate a Child Initiative. Through this program, the church hopes to improve education for one million children in the U.S. and around the world in the next four years, focusing particularly on strengthening early childhood education and decreasing the drop-out rate.

Financial literacy helps many overcome disadvantage By Judy Klamm

Is there a solution to help those who are impoverished overcome poverty? In How the Poor Can Save Capitalism, John H. Bryant offers the idea of getting free enterprise and entrepreneurship into communities to help members rise to the middle class. Often those in poverty face financial illiteracy, which can help keep them impoverished. The author proposes teaching financial literacy skills. He also envisions volunteers and mentors to help young people start businesses. He says this knowledge can help impoverished communities grow into healthy working environments that benefit everyone.

Together in Action on Human Trafficking Awareness Day

On a chilly morning in January (January 11, to be exact), seven Presbyterian women (and one man!) from The Stone Church of Willow Glen in San José, California, stood with signs, brochures and balloons on the corner by our church and immediately across the street from the church, facing morning traffic in both directions. We stood from 8:30–9:30 AM and gave out brochures to passers-by and to parents stopping at the stop sign after dropping kids off at school. We got "honks" of support and even a \$10 contribution to the cause which has been donated to a local human trafficking consortium. Other years on Human Trafficking Awareness Day, we have had small gatherings to see films or participate in a simple worship service. This year called for "action," so we did it! A police officer drove by, saw us, turned around and came to talk with us. Turns out, he had been on the human trafficking squad and had developed some of the literature on trafficking that's distributed by our police department!

Plan now for May Together in Action Days, May 2–8, 2016

PW urges groups to plan events around Children's Book Week, May 2–8. Ideas:

- Community Story Hour (host it at your church and read aloud to children of the community; may be a one-time event or ongoing).
- Roving Readers (form a group of volunteers who go to community centers, hospitals and other sites where children are served, to read aloud to children). Focus especially on underserved children.
- Community book drive (for children who don't have books at home)
- Used book sale (selling books at very reasonable prices for families who can't usually afford books)
- After-school story hour (volunteers can "staff" this as frequently as there are volunteers)
- Lending library for families (donations might allow lending to anyone in the community who wants to avail themselves); emphasis on books with messages that address concerns of children and families; positive messages, empowering stories, etc.
- International Literacy Society suggests building a "Little Free Library"; see http://literacyworldwide .org for kit and ideas.
- Contribute to Thank and Birthday Offerings, which frequently give grants to education programs.
- Volunteer at local libraries (help for a day, or on a regular basis).
- Contact schools; volunteer to help children who are falling behind because of poor language skills.
- Think about donating books to organizations that supply books to children in areas of need.
- Consider equipping children in your community with electronic book readers.
- Supply nutritious snacks at story hours, cushy chairs, warm hugs things hungry children need.
- Donate books to hospitals, schools, community centers and more.
- Play word and number games with children in after-school and community-center settings.
- Provide story Bibles for children in need.
