Churchwide Coordinating Team saves thousands of dollars, meets by videoconference

The Churchwide Coordinating Team of Presbyterian Women met March 2, 2017. For the first time in PW history, the CCT conducted the biannual board meeting by videoconference. The estimated savings to the national budget is \$30,000. When the CCT voted last fall to conduct the meeting telephonically, there was a healthy amount of skepticism, and the vote margin was slim. After the meeting, board member evaluations were positive.

Staff were tasked with finding a platform that would work best for the call and with training for CCT members. Committee meetings were conducted via Zoom (the videoconferencing tool) prior to the full board meeting. Reports and meeting information were posted to the CCT's shared Google site for review before the meeting.

Though two two-hour calls were scheduled for the meeting, the CCT completed business during the first call. Jane DeFord, synod rep from the Synod of the Trinity, offered an opening devotion. Moderator Carol Winkler closed the meeting with a litany of thanksgiving for synod representatives who are completing their service on the CCT (see photos and caption at right).

The next CCT meeting will be at the Hampton Inn in Louisville, Kentucky, August 30–September 3, 2017.

Administration Committee

 The CCT received a letter from Racial Ethnic and Women's Ministries, Presbyterian Mission Agency, relaying a \$5,000 gift for the 2018 Churchwide Gathering and a \$4,000 gift to the Mission Pledge.

Antiracism Committee (ARC)

- ARC will conduct antiracism training at PW's fall 2017 board meeting.

Help for those new to PW!

If you are reading these words, you are probably a PW leader and know all things PW! But many of our faithful are unaware of some of the finer points of their amazing organization. That's why we began a "PW 101" series in the last newsletter. PW 101.2: PW Circles and their Leadership

Presbyterian Women meet at the congregation level in "circles." No matter what the activities, as long as women meet to build community, support mission, nurture faith and/or work for justice and peace, those women are forming a "circle." No matter how many or how few activities a women's circle undertakes, if they do it on behalf of the PW Purpose (see last newsletter), they are a PW circle. Leadership in single-circle groups at the congregational level ideally consists of a moderator (to provide leadership to the circle and ensure communication among the members and with the congregation and session); a secretary/historian to record the work of the circle: and a treasurer to maintain the financial records of the circle. But PW is flexible! Circles don't have to be called circles and a team can have leaders who "wear more than one [leadership] hat."

March 2017 CCT meeting highlights, cont'd from 1

- The Bible Study Committee met in March and selected the proposal from Lynn Miller for a 2020–2021 Bible study on lament.
- #GivingTuesday, #GratefulMonday and year-end giving raised an additional \$2,500 for the Mission Pledge, PW's annual fund. The committee will focus on increasing individual giving to the Mission Pledge.
- PW, in partnership with Racial Ethnic and Women's Ministries, will host a meet-and-greet this summer at Big Tent in St. Louis.
- The committee is developing a celebration/giving opportunity called PW Founders' Day, which will coincide with the anniversary of the 1988 national PW business meeting.
- The Horizons Editorial Committee met March 28 by videoconference.

Finance Committee

 A current budget report/statement of financial position, as well as revenue figures for 2014, 2015, and 2016, were presented to the board.

Inclusive Community Committee

- The committee conducted three conference calls prior to this CCT meeting regarding the September 2016 Young Women Representatives' Report. Action items include committee reassignment to ensure better representation, a job description review, a mentoring plan, and proposals for recruiting and participation.
- Synod reps are educating coordinating teams on the new PW Manual: A
 Guide for PW Groups and provided
 feedback on their experiences.
- A Synod Moderator Network has been established. The first call was February 28. The moderators decided to meet every two months by phone, with a face-to-face meeting at the 2018 Churchwide Gathering. The next call is April 25.

Justice and Peace Committee

- Members of the committee participated in the 2018 UN Commission on the Status of Women. For more on CSW61, see www.unwomen.org/en/ csw/csw61-2017.
- Members were encouraged to attend and spread the word about Ecumenical Advocacy Days held each April in Washington, DC. Financial as-

- sistance is available through PW's Leadership Development Program. See https://advocacydays.org.
- A bookmark summarizing PW's justice and peace work will be updated.
- J&P plans to expand the Courageous Conversations program, suggesting topics for certain months with accompanying suggestions for action and resources.
- The CCT continues to support the PC(USA) Educate a Child initiative. Together in Action Days in May will again be around the issue of children's literacy, including youth in the scope of the program. This will be held during Children's Book Week, May 1–7, 2017. See www.presbyteri anwomen.org/justice.

Mission Relationships Committee

- The CCT approved the Bay Area Anti-Trafficking Coalition and Puente Community Resource Center, Pescadero, California, as USAME 2016 projects selected for PW extra giving opportunities.
- Fourteen representatives from 12 synods will participate in the Global Exchange to Indonesia, September 12–29, 2017. The scripture for the exchange: Rom. 1:12: "so that we may be mutually encouraged by each other's faith, both yours and mine."
- USAME 2019 will be hosted by Geneva and Cuyuga Syracuse PW in the Synod of the Northeast. The moderatorial team will appoint a chair and national planning team.
- World Mission's Mother's Day Card program is being discontinued. PW leaders can still encourage PW to send gifts to Healthy Women Healthy Families through the ECO E052136.
- The Creative Ministries Offering Committee met February 23–25 to select 2017 Thank Offering recipients. Fifteen grant recipients were selected. The total amount awarded will be \$382,500. See the July/August issue of Horizons for a full report.

Moderator's Message

Thank you PW in the congregations, presbyteries and synods for the opportunities to be with you and to learn from you. In every visit I have learned something spectacular that I wanted to share with others. I wish I could pack you up in my backpack and take you with me but instead, I will use this column to share some of the many stories, ideas and possibilities I hear and see.

I am often asked how to get women involved in PW. I have shared many times my story of being "loved into PW." PW circles are opportunities for women to be in community with one another. A "circle" is a small group that gathers to provide an inclusive, caring community of women. It is where faith is nurtured and growth takes place, where women are challenged and reach out to others, where Christian leadership is born, nurtured and sent forth.

One "circle" gathers in the church kitchen to share their culinary skills, have conversation and reach out to others. They prepare dinner for themselves as well as leftovers. The leftovers are packed up and frozen, ready to be delivered to a family who needs to be supported. It may be a new baby or a member recently released from the hospital. What about the new folks who have visited the church and haven't joined yet, have no local family support and could use a gesture of kindness? These women are ready with their leftovers. What a great opportunity!

Another "circle" of women—the Wine and Horizons circle—gather in a home/ local food establishment/bookstore and talk about the articles in Horizons. Their conversations have led them to respond to needs in their communities, often including women who can't be involved in a monthly Bible study. One group arranged for women recently released from incarceration to be the custodians in several of the churches in their community. It connected the women and empowered them all in unique ways.

As graduation draws near for young women in our churches, I offer this idea. What about one or more scholarships for high school girls? Invite them to your spring Birthday Offering celebration. Present them with the scholarship for what is next in their life—college or job opportunity. But don't stop there. Keep in touch over the next few years with an occasional note/ card, a church bulletin, a picture of church activities, a restaurant gift card, a care package. The young woman who seeks a job rather than college might appreciate a lunch date to see how things are going or an invitation to join your circle. You are building a lifelong relationship and when they are ready, maybe they will create that community of women known as a new PW circle.

Trinity Presbyterian Church Oklahoma City sponsored citywide Racist Anonymous meetings for 10 weeks this spring. The average attendance was 20. Rev. Ron Buford, African American pastor and founder of Racists Anonymous, says, "It's time to pull the cover off racism rather than blaming each other and trying to figure out which of us is the most racist. Can we rid the nation and perhaps the world of racism? Let's build an infectious movement of people who will pledge their lives to being mindful of our own racism, being mindful of our powerlessness to rid ourselves of racism without each other, and consciously turning it over to a higher power."

Online Antiracism Digital Library curated by CCT rep

Did you know that Anita Coleman, synod representative to CCT from the Synod of Southern California/Hawaii maintains an antiracism digital library? The Anti-racism Digital Library (ADL), dedicated to the victims of the 2016 Charleston AME church shooting, is a research and development initiative that aims to be a clearinghouse for antiracism resources.

Collections such as "A Mote in Minerva's Eye," "Comfort Women," "Presbyterian Women," "Progressive Christians Uniting," "The Intercultural Church," and "OC Cities for CEDAW: Reclaiming Ourselves," showcase people, regions, and communities.

Anita says, "They are a microcosm of our larger world, representing different geographical origins and culture, language group and faith traditions. Other collections such as 'Antiracist Identity,' 'Racial Imagination,' 'American Identity,' 'Christian Imagination' and 'Intersectional Invisibility' offer new language for fuelling the human imagination with concepts and categories that describe essential humanity. Collections bring together resources created by diverse people, groups and projects that are adapting antiracism to help and build inclusive and caring communities."

Presbyterian Women in the Synods

PWSNE support YAVs, host vice mod, celebrate new PWC

In PWSNE news (submitted by Charlotte Hasselbarth):

- PW in the Synod of the Northeast (PWSNE) works closely with the Young Adult Volunteer (YAV) Program coordinator in Louisville to support YAVs. In 2014 we started offering grants to YAVs whose home was in our synod. In 2016 we expanded to include YAVs who were stationed in our synod. So far we have given out 13 \$500 grants to YAVs from our synod and four \$350 grants to YAVs stationed in the Northeast. YAVs must apply for the grants, but nothing is required in return. We receive communication from the YAVs and hope to invite some to speak at PW events. We're continually working on this grant program to strengthen the relationship between YAVs and PWSNE. - In September, CCT Vice Moderator for Mission Relationships Judy Persons toured New York State from Albany to Buffalo (the Erie Canal Corridor). She visited five PWPs. Judy spoke at three PWP fall gatherings—Albany, Geneva and Western New York—and the joint annual PWP retreat of Utica and Cayuga-Syracuse. It was wonderful to expose so many women to someone from the Churchwide Coordinating Team.
- A new PW group, Presbyterian Women's Fellowship in Westminster Presbyterian Church in Albany, New York has been formed. This congregation has a large number of people from Africa. This group is currently made up of mainly of women who have emigrated from Africa to the United States. At this time, the group's mission is supporting families from Africa as they get settled in the Albany area.
