h. She served as associate for black congregational enhancement in the PC(USA) and as staff associate for racial ethnic ministries in the PCUS.

k. She worked for eight years as a staff associate for PC(USA) focusing on leader development in African American churches and on

- u. She was vice moderator of justice and peace concerns for PW Churchwide and served as a liaison to the Advisory Committee on Social Witness Policy.
 - v. She was moderator of National Black Presbyterian Women and has served in governing bodies at all levels of the Presbyterian church. She was also staff for Women's Ministries for nine years.
 - w. She was a self-supporting missionary to Congo, where she established the Pantops Home for Girls.
- x. She was the first African American woman from the Presbytery of Baltimore to be elected commissioner to the General Assembly.
- y. She founded the Haines Normal and Industrial Institute in 1883, established the first kindergarten for black children in Augusta, Georgia, and was instrumental in founding the Lamar Nursing School in 1887.
- **26.** Patricia Gill Turner **z.** She joined the national staff of the PC(USA) in 1973, and served in Women's Ministries as an associate for leadership development and spiritual growth.
- 27. Artence J. Walton aa. She was the first African American woman to serve as moderator for PW.
