The Gathering will be held at the Galt House in Louisville, Kentucky, August 2–5, 2018. Rooms start at \$144/night; suites start at \$159, both plus taxes.

#### Registration now open

#### Tips for online registration

- For easiest online registration, have your registration booklet marked with your programming choices and be prepared to enter or create a username and password.
- To register, go to www.presbyterian women.org/gathering.
  - The screen opens to the logo and "Churchwide Gathering" in the middle of the page.
  - Click on "Register now for the 2018 Churchwide Gathering!" You will be taken to the PC(USA) event registration site.
  - 3. Here is where you will need a username and password. If you don't have one, you will need to create one. **Note:** If you registered online for the 2015 Churchwide Gathering, your PC(USA) online account should still be active and you can use the same username and password.
  - 4. If you are a voting representative, do not register until you read the information you received by email January 22. If you did not receive this email, contact patricia.long fellow@pcusa.org.

- After you submit your registration, click the link on the confirmation screen to reserve a room at the Galt House.
- If you are mailing in your registration, please write clearly. If you want an emailed registration acknowledgement, please write your email clearly, as well; otherwise, a printed copy of your registration acknowledgement will be mailed to you.
- During the first three days of online registration (January 15–17), there was a glitch with the emailed registration acknowledgements. If you registered online and haven't gotten your acknowledgement, please email pwcwg2018@aol.com and the registrar, Theresa Underwood, will email your acknowledgement.



#### Presbyterian Women, Advocacy Committee for Women's Concerns issue statement on sexual harassment, abuse

Presbyterian Women in the PC(USA), Inc., and the PC(USA)'s Advocacy Committee for Women's Concerns have released a joint statement on sexual injustice. Here is the statement (you may download the statement at www.presbyterianwomen.org/news):

As courageous women, children, and youth from across the United States share their #MeToo and #ChurchToo stories, we reflect on the PW mission which says, in part,

that Presbyterian Women will build an inclusive, caring community of women that strengthens the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), works for justice and peace, and witnesses to the promise of God's realm. As a committee called by the church to be a prophetic voice to and for the church on issues of gender justice, ACWC is a partner to PW in this mission.

Together, we respond with empathy for the experiences of injustice due to sexual violence, sexual harassment, sexual assault, and other violence and discrimination against women. Together, we issue a call for repentance and justice-seeking. We offer this statement in hope of continuing conversations and healing actions within the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) at both the local and national levels.

God has created all people equally and directed us to love others as we love ourselves. Our Creator's teachings must be demonstrated in our actions as well as in our conversations. Jesus models for us how to live out the gospel of justice and peace.

#### Help for those new to PW!

#### PW 101.5: The PW Circle Revisited

PW 101.2 introduced the idea that PW groups at the congregational level consist of circles. The circle is the foundation of all that PW does. PW 101.4 introduced the idea that PW is connectional and that the PW in the Congregation (PWC) is connected to PW at each level. To elaborate:

The PWC group informs and responds to the ministry of PW at all levels of the church: local, presbytery, synod and churchwide. The PWC has representation and contact with the PW in the Presbytery (PWP); the PWP connects to PW in the Synod (PWS); and the PWS connects to PW Churchwide. Information and programming moves in all directions throughout the structure, with local and regional work impacting national work, and national work informing regional and local work. There is good work happening in PW all of the time, from the mission of a local church in Boise to the fulfillment of a Thank Offering grant in Sudan!

In 1988, Christie Loney wrote:

The circle can be a place that challenges us to stretch beyond our known limits. Within the confines of a loving, accepting community we can take risky steps, fail and not feel foolish. This enables us to move beyond the safe place, reach out to others and have our faith tested. In the circle, Christian leadership is born, nurtured and sent forth into ministry. Maybe you are a young woman, a woman in her mid-life crisis, a businesswoman, a working mother, a single parent, an elderly woman . . .; each of you has a place in a circle . . . . A local church may have a number of circles, each one unique and different. Yet a commonality . . . binds them together . . . .\*

The energy surrounding sexual assault issues has created an opportunity for our denomination to

take the next step toward healing. How do we correct the culture that allows sexual abuse? How do we empower women to help themselves? How do we neutralize the harmful ripple effects of sexual violence and other forms of abuse? Presbyterian Women, in covenant with the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) and the Advocacy Committee for Women's Concerns, encourage women to speak up and

speak out when they experience abuse, whether it occurs at home, in the work place, or in our churches.

At the same time, the faith community must confess and hold itself accountable for fostering environments that allow for abuses and encourage silence, repent and create systems where justice for victims is accessible, and offer resources to support healing for victims and secondary victims of abuse. We must individually and collectively begin to deconstruct ideologies that perpetuate maleness as superior to femaleness, whether in our imagery for God or in our references to one another, and think of one another in a way that lets us see our gender differences as blessings to be respected and celebrated.

PW partners with Presbyterians Against Domestic Violence, encourages the Courageous Conversations in October (Domestic Violence Awareness Month), participates in the UN's UNITE to End Violence Against Women campaign, encourages ratification of the UN Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Violence Against Women (CEDAW), observes International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women on November 25 each year and 16 Days of Activism against Gender Violence beginning each November 25, and urges all to observe Orange Day on the 25th of every month by wearing orange to raise awareness of the global movement to end violence against women (see endviolence.un.org).

PW and ACWC also encourage participation in "Thursdays in Black," an initiative of the World Council of Churches seeking a world without rape and violence, by wearing black on Thursdays in solidarity, in protest, in mourning, and for awareness and hope.

PW supports local shelters and recovery programs for survivors of violence and trafficking, and advocates at the UN Commission on the Status of Women. PW at the national level and ACWC are committed to breaking the code of silence with stories and education at the congregational level, and enlisting the help of good men in ending the culture of violence. The Advocacy Committee for Women's Concerns will be at the 223rd General Assembly in St. Louis handing out #MeToo and #ChurchToo/#Time'sUp buttons in the exhibit hall. There will be awareness-raising efforts calling for the church's action in several GA resolutions. PW will hold a march for justice and peace at the 2018 Churchwide Gathering in August 2018.

#### A Prayer for Healing

Gracious God. In these troubled times we come asking you to give us discernment as we search for ways to respect one another and to heal our hearts and, our thoughts, and our actions. We seek to eliminate all forms of violence against women and girls. We seek to respect one another, to show Christian love, to live in harmony, and to be compassionate as we right the sins that have been committed.

# Leadership development grants

Remember that PW Churchwide does have a limited number of leadership development grants available to help with Gathering costs. The deadline for applying is May 1, 2018, but

early application is encouraged. A link to the application form is on the Gathering web page. First-time Gathering attendees will receive priority consideration; voting representatives and current board directors are not eligible to apply. Do note that these grants are reimbursed funds (disbursed after receipts are submitted).

PW Disaster Preparedness Trainers are expected to organize and conduct a minimum of three disaster preparedness trainings a year, sharing the basics of disaster preparedness with congregations and presbyteries. The training will be held on August 1, 2018, and is open to all interested PW. PDA will pay for two nights of lodging: July 31 and August 1. All meals on August 1 will be provided. Birthday Offering materials mail in mid February

"Welcome to this place," the theme of the 2018 Birthday Offering, speaks to our call as Christians to "missional hospitality," as PW board member and pastor Jane DeFord says in the dedication service for the Birthday Offering. She adds, "Consider the missional hospitality extended to victims of domestic abuse and violence when a safe home is offered to the battered and the broken." The Birthday Offering will fund a grant to the Dwelling Place, one of three recipients of our missional hospitality in 2018.

The Dwelling Place in Minneapolis and St.
Paul, Minnesota; Cottage Village, a tiny-house
community for low-income residents in Cottage
Grove, Oregon; and Village of Grace Center for Physical
and Spiritual Health in Tegucigalpa, Honduras, offer missional
hospitality for survivors of abuse, impoverished rural families and
mission teams working alongside the people of Honduras.

The Birthday Offering celebrates Presbyterian Women's history of missional hospitality. It was launched in 1922 and since that time, has funded nearly 100 major mission projects that continue to make a difference in the lives of women and children. While the projects and donation amounts have changed, PW's commitment to improving the lives of women and children have not. We continue to need broad, consistent support from Presbyterian women and others in order to continue funding mission projects like the ones selected for 2018.

We ask that you promote the Birthday Offering in your congregations using the materials that are being mailed in

mid February to each PC(USA) congregation and each PW moderator, treasurer and co-moderator in the synods and presbyteries. #### HLM pins enclosed in fair trade bags

If you have received or given an Honorary Life Membership within the last few months, you may have noticed that the pin was enclosed in a colorful gift bag. That bag was handcrafted by a Peruvian woman whose life has been transformed after joining a sewing

cooperative named *Kuichi* (the Quechua word for "rainbow"). Thanks to Partners for Just Trade, a mission partner of the

PC(USA) and PW, the artisans of Kuichi are receiving a fair wage and decent work conditions for their highly-prized work. Thanks to this newfound stability, the women of Kuichi are emerging as leaders in their community, and are working toward bringing clean water, a sewage system and electricity to their dusty town high in the Andes.

#### Advice for starting a new PW group

Thinking about starting a new PW group? Congratulations!

As you may know, Presbyterian Women (PW) does not have members, as such, but participants. Participation in PW is open to all women who choose to be supportive of PW in any way.

The PW Manual affirms this:
"Presbyterian Women intentionally seeks the inclusion of all ages, races, ethnicities and geographic locations so that it reflects the rich diversity of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.).
All women who are members of the

[PC(USA)] are considered part of Presby-

terian Women" (p. 5).

You probably also know that PWs are guided by the PW Purpose, which speaks to the mission and ministry of PW, as well as PW's role in the PC(USA). (See PW's website for the Purpose.)

PW is connectional, just like the PC(USA). The organization is organized at each level of the church so that it can support the church at each level. Because PW is connectional, a local PW who is moved to start a PW group is encouraged to seek advice and assistance from other Presbyterian women in her congregation, in other congregations, or at other levels of the organization. If you are starting a new PW group, you will want to speak with your PW in the Presbytery moderator or PW in the Synod moderator. Email patricia. longfellow@pcusa.org to learn who your moderators are.

The PW Manual: A Guide for PW Groups offers invaluable and specific guidance and ideas on how to start a PW group (p. 13). It is actually very easy to get started—your group can decide how to be PW in your congregation. Groups often begin by using the annual Bible study and/or participating in the Thank or Birthday Offering programs.

I want to stop and say, "Thank you, God, for the women of PW." Let us celebrate how we have been better together than alone, as women of faith, for 30 years. Each of us has walked the PW Purpose with others. In this year of celebration, I hope you will reach out and say "Thank you" to the many women who are your cloud of witnesses.

Reflecting on the past 30 years leads us to reflect on the next 30 years. As we look forward, I leave you with Hillary's words: "... wishing you a plentitude of opportunities to use your... sustaining energy and love in synergistic, hope-giving service," because, together, what a difference PW makes to the church and to the world!

#### Working for Justice and Peace .....

#### Together in Action for Children's Literacy in May

PW urges action around children's literacy during the week of April 30–May 6, 2018, Children's Book Week, and PW's second Together in Action week of the year. Try one of these ideas:

- Roving Readers (form a group of volunteers who go to community centers, hospitals and other sites to read aloud to children).
- Community book drive (for children who don't have books at home)



- Lending library for families; emphasis on books with positive messages, empowering stories, etc.
- Give to PW's Thank and Birthday Offerings, which fund education programs and help build schools.
- Volunteer at a local library (for a day or on a regular basis).
- Volunteer at schools to help children who are falling behind.
- At story hours, supply nutritious snacks, cushy chairs, warm hugs—things hungry children need.
- Community Story Hour (host it at your church and read aloud to children of the community; may be a one-time event or ongoing).
- Consider working with a middle-school-age or high-schoolage group. There are uncertain readers of every age and giving a boost (including mentoring) can help young people who are at a disadvantage socially, academically and/or economically (and, therefore, at risk).
- Donate books to hospitals, schools, community centers . . .

#### Field testers sought for 2020–2021 Horizons Bible study

Horizons Bible studies are developed by Presbyterian Women for Presbyterian Women. Presbyterian women nominate authors who submit outlines and sample lessons. The Churchwide Bible study committee meets in the spring to review proposals and choose an author, four years out. The chosen author writes a first draft that is field tested by PW groups around the country. Field testing takes place between August and December every year. Groups receive the first draft of the study along with evaluation forms to complete as they make their way through each lesson. All evaluation forms are sent to the Bible study author, who uses feedback to edit and rewrite her work. Field testing is the best way for your voice to be heard as new Bible studies are developed. 

Transitional housing, education, food, clothing, traumainformed support services, programming and mentoring for women are all part of the mission of the Dwelling Place. This Birthday Offering grant will help the Dwelling Place purchase a vacant lot where they will construct a multiuse building with spaces suitable for large and small group programming, one-on-one case management, safe living space and staff offices. With the additional building, Dwelling Place will be able to serve even more women and children who are seeking safety.



The 2018–2019 PW/Horizons Bible study, God's Promise: I Am with You, takes readers on a journey through scripture to consider circumstances in which God articulated God's promise of presence. This study does not delve deeply into manifestations of God's presence—the tabernacle, the ark of the covenant, manna, the Temple, pillars of cloud and fire—but rather on God's actual articulation of God's promise. We will see anew that God offered these words of profound comfort and commitment to individuals and communities from the time of the patriarchs to that of the prophets; from the judges to the kings; before, during, and after the exile; into the New Testament and beyond, to the end of the age.

During these nine lessons, we will discover how God's promise speaks to *our* circumstances, as individuals and as a community. We will be encouraged to know of God's presence with us wherever we find ourselves on this life's journey—through uncertainty and discouragement; during trials and times of powerlessness; when we seek God's guidance and, yes, during our everyday lives.

Lesson One: God with Us Wherever We Are

**Focus:** God's promise to be with us allows us to consider the surprising and powerful intimacy of God's willingness to be with us in all our circumstances.

Lesson Four: God with Us When We Seek God

**Focus:** God summons God's people, and especially God's leaders, to walk in God's ways and to seek God.

Lesson Five: God with Us When We're Powerless

Focus: God's promise of presence when we are powerless invites us to lay down our weapons of worry and keep our eyes on God.

Lesson Six: God with Us Through Our Trials

Focus: God says, "I will be with you," and that promise of presence

conveys the depth of God's love.

Lesson Seven: God with Us as Emmanuel

Focus: The promise shifts from the "God with us" promise to the

"God with us" person of Jesus Christ.

Focus: God who was incarnate in Jesus Christ is now present as the

Holy Spirit.

Primary Scripture: John 14:1-31

Lesson Nine: God with Us

Focus: Jesus extends the promise of presence to his followers,

whom he sends into the world.

Primary Scripture: Matthew 18:15-20; 28:16-20
