We're so close! The Gathering will be held at the Galt House in Louisville, Kentucky, August 2–5, 2018.

Register from the Gathering web page—www.presbyterianwomen.org /gathering—or by mail, using the registration form found in the back of the registration booklet. Both registration formats allow you to purchase a ticket to your synod meal, buy a Gathering tote bag or PW-logo water bottle, and purchase meals for a guest.

Please note that online registration will close July 7; mailed registrations must be postmarked by July 7. After this date, please register on site at the Gathering!

If you are a voting representative to the Churchwide Business Meeting, please note that this is a separate event immediately preceding the Churchwide Gathering, and registration for it is a separate process. If you are a presbytery moderator or other voting representative and you have not received Business Meeting Memos 1 and 2, please contact Patricia Longfellow at patricia.long fellow@pcusa.org.

Travel, housing arrangements

The Galt House is the site for Gathering programming and housing. Sleeping rooms start at \$144/night; suites start at \$159, both plus taxes. Arrangements for housing are separate from Gathering registration. Reserve your room by calling the Galt House, 800/843-4258, or by following the link for housing at www. presbyterianwomen.org/gathering. When you reserve a room at the Galt House, you will receive three \$5 vouchers for food and nonalcoholic beverages purchased in the Galt House. If Delta is your airline of choice, please consider using the Delta promo code NMRUG. This will get you a discount of 3 to 10% (depending on your zone), and will get PW Churchwide points toward free flights. The discount is valid on flights to Louisville between July 24 and August 11, 2018; valid for travel within U.S. and Canada only.

Spring board meeting highlights

The PW Board of Directors met in Louisville, Kentucky, March 1–4, 2018. This was the last board meeting of the 2015–2018 triennium. Ten of the 16 synod representatives will continue into the next triennium. The rest of the 2018–2021 team will be elected during the upcoming Business Meeting and installed on Saturday night during the Churchwide Gathering.

To prepare for the Business Meeting, the Administration Committee brought the 2019–2021 proposed budget and proposed bylaws changes to the board for approval. The budget and bylaws, as well as the slate of nominees for the next triennium, will be adopted by the voting representatives in August.

The committee also brought the Institutional Relationship Agreement between Presbyterian Women in the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), Inc., and the Presbyterian Mission Agency of the PC(USA). The agreement is renewed every four years. The Presbyterian Mission Agency Board will forward the agreement to the 223rd General Assembly (2018). (See page 9 for more on this.)

The Stewardship Committee, a new working committee formed during the fall 2017 meeting, gave their first report. This committee will plan for the financial health of the organization, integrate the promotion of PW's annual fund (aka Mission Pledge) and other pieces of Celebration Giving into the communication and promotion of PW's mission and ministry, and promote an understanding of stewardship as it relates to the discipleship of Presbyterian Women.

Antiracism

 Anita Coleman will present an antiracism workshop at the Churchwide Gathering; the committee will focus on cultural diversity at their table in the exhibit hall.

PW 101.....

Help for those new to PW!

This is the sixth in a series of PW basics for those new to PW and those who sense some gaps in their PW knowledge.

PW 101.6: We Gather

Presbyterian Women is connectional. And that means we gather! This is such an important part of our shared journey of faith that coordinating teams at each level of the organization (congregation, presbytery, synod and churchwide) are equally tasked with promoting "attendance at PW events at the presbytery, synod and churchwide levels."

What happens at gatherings? Depends! Sometimes a business meeting is part of a presbytery or synod gathering; the business meeting deals with, well, the business of the group, which often includes the installation of new leadership. Gatherings are also the place to learn about the organization (and the organization's resources such as Horizons magazine and Bible study, which are promoted by the assigned and invited Horizons representative) and activities of the organization (Bible study, service projects and more). Workshops, presentations, community projects, stewardship opportunities, Bible study and fellowship are important components of gatherings. Gatherings are serious business in the most joyful, PW Purpose-full way!

Stay connected with your PW circle so you can learn when your presbytery or synod plan to gather as gathering frequencies differ by region. At the national level, Presbyterian Women gather every three years. In 2018 (this year!), Presbyterian Women will gather in Louisville from August 2–5, 2018. Visit www.presbyterianwomen.org/gathering to register for a truly faith-affirming experience!

- The theme for the Stepping Out for Justice and Peace March at the Churchwide Gathering is "Ninth Street Divide," addressing segregation and racism in Louisville, Kentucky, and around the country. Join local and national leaders.
- JP will host a "Tea for Peace" activity in the JP booth at the Churchwide Gathering.
- The committee proposes that shirts of certain colors be worn on certain days of the Gathering;
 - a black shirt on Thursday for Thursdays in Black (a World Council of Churches effort re: violence against women)
 - PW shirts (of any color) on Friday for the JP march
- green shirts on Saturday for Creation Care observance
- PW Communications is looking for articles that shine a light on PWs justice and peace work, as well as stories of the Mission Pledge, PW's annual fund, in action. Send 250-500 word articles to yvonne.hileman@pcusa.org and carissa.herold@ pcusa.org.
- JP encourages PWs to sponsor YAVs and mentor returning YAVs. Visit the YAVs website (www.presbyterianmission.org/ ministries/yav) to learn more.

Mission Relationships Committee (MRC)

- The board voted that the Global Exchange and USA Mission Experiences take place in alternate trienniums. The next USAME will be in 2019. The next Global Exchange will be in 2022.
- The theme for the 2019 USA Mission Experience is "Standing on the Shoulders of Empowered Women." The scripture is Galatians 5:1a (NRSV), "For freedom Christ has set us free. Stand firm." The site will be Western New York, July 12–22, 2019. The cost is \$2,200 plus travel to the Rochester airport. Applications are available at www.presbyterianwomen.org and at the Churchwide Gathering. The deadline for submission is August 15. See page 8 for more.
- The CCT approved the following two exta giving opportunities from the Global Exchange to Indonesia:
 - Ciliwung Community Center in Jakarta, where women work as a group, learning nutrition, how to supplement their incomes, and more. There is a kindergarten and library.
 - Suwung School and Clinic, located in a landfill in Bali where people live and sort trash; the GPIB (Reformed Church) provides a medical clinic once a month.
- Extra Giving Opportunity Accounts, including projects from Global Exchanges and USA Mission Experiences, will be maintained for six years. Accounts older than six years will be closed. Funds remaining in existing accounts will be sent to

the designated project. If the project is no longer requesting funds, the balance will be incorporated into the Mission Pledae/ Annual Fund.

- A "Knit for Kids" sweater pattern will be added as a hands-on mission opportunity. Contact katharine .reeves@pcusa.org for more information.

 Educational Opportunity #31, "Preventing and Responding to Violence Against Women and Children in Africa," was previously scheduled for Saturday at 10:30 AM

and 1:45 PM. It will now be held Friday at 10:30 AM and 1:45 PM. Those who signed up for the Saturday timeslots, either 31D or 31E, have been contacted by the registrar.

- Mission Tour B: Center for Lay Ministries replaces Jesus Cares at Exit 0 as one of the two stops. Center for Lay Ministries provides services to vulnerable populations in the local community. In addition to operating a 12-bed facility for women who are addicted to drugs and/or alcohol, this organization runs a food pantry and teaches classes to promote self-sufficiency and healthy living. Those who signed up for this tour have been contacted by the registrar.
- The Thursday 2 PM tour of the Presbyterian Center is full, but another tour has been added: 3-3:30 PM on Thursday.
- Educational Opportunity #29, "Mission Together," a Korean-language ed op, was to be led by Global Partner Yoonhee Lee, but she will not be able to attend the Gathering. Sarah Chae will lead a Korean-language ed op, "Anxiety and Resiliency," focusing on how to alleviate anxiety and reframe our perspectives. Sarah Chae is a PhD candidate at Princeton Theological

Seminary in pastoral theology. This opportunity is scheduled for Friday, August 3, at 10:30 AM and 3:30 PM.

Mission Pledge (PW's annual fund) materials mail in July



Safe Motherhood Kits no longer accepted by IMA World Health

For many years, Presbyterian Women have made valuable contributions to God's mission in the world through their gifts for women and children distributed worldwide by the IMA World Health Safe Motherhood Kit program and the IMA Sewing for Mission program. As the world and the church change, so do the ways that we engage in mission. IMA World Health has asked that we discontinue sending the Safe Motherhood Kit and Sewing for Mission items to the New Windsor warehouse for distribution.

The Safe Motherhood Kit and Sewing for Mission items that were received by the New Windsor warehouse prior to March 16, 2018, will be sent to Haiti. The baby gowns, blankets and hats will be used to make baby kits for the Lutheran World Relief program. The adult gowns, single sheets and face masks will be distributed locally in New Windsor. Please do not send any of these items to New Windsor.

Presbyterian Women are being encouraged to continue donating items for hygiene kits and school kits.

Hygiene Kits

- 1 hand towel (approx. 16" x 28") 1 washcloth
- 1 wide-tooth comb (without package)
- 1 nail clipper (remove from package)
- 1 bar bath sized soap (in wrapper)
- 1 toothbrush (in original package)
- 10 adhesive bandage strips

Please do not add toothpaste to the hygiene kit. Toothpaste will be added just

- 1 pair of blunt scissors (rounded tip)
- 3 70-count spiral notebooks or tapebound pads of 8"x10 ½" ruled paper or pads with 200–210 sheets of ruled paper. Do not include filler paper.
- 1 30-centimeter (12") ruler
- 1 hand-held pencil sharpener
- 6 new pencils with erasers
- 1 large eraser
- 1 box of 24 crayons
- 1 cloth bag, 12"x14"x17" finished size, with cloth handles; pattern available

Pack all items in the cloth bag.

Moderator's Message ...

It is with mixed emotions that I approach the end of my term as moderator of PW in the PC(USA). I am excited for the women who will be installed in August. They will lead PW for-



ward in these challenging, changing times. Recently, a board member shared a question that is asked of pastors in an exit interview. "Did you accomplish what you hoped in your time of service?" - Without PW, over \$60 million wouldn't have been given to mission in the last 30 years.
- It takes basic funding to make an organization run. I want to be a part of the PW organization through my giving.

Take action for refugees and immigrants

PW recently participated in Ecumenical Advocacy Days where the emphasis was on advocacy for refugees. The theme, "A World Uprooted," touched on root causes of forced migration, including poverty, climate change and war.

The church has mission partners in the countries most affected by humanitarian crises, including the Democratic Republic of Congo, South Sudan, Lebanon, Syria, Israel/Palestine, Bangladesh, and many others. Mission co-workers in Democratic Republic of Congo, for example, are very concerned with the continuing crisis in the Kasai region of that country and ask us to advocate, pray and give to relief efforts: www.presbyterian mission.org/story/call-action-democratic-republic-congo/. Workshops at EAD on the millions of people displaced by war in South Sudan and the millions of Palestinian refugees at risk of losing education and health services unless the U.S. releases funds for UNRWA told of the vulnerability of millions of people living in very insecure conditions. You can help.

- Advocate for just immigration policies and for funding for UNRWA as well as other humanitarian aid and relief efforts.
- Give to PW's Mission Pledge, Thank Offering and Birthday Offerings, which make possible PW programming and fund ministries for women, refugees, children and other marginalized people around the world and in this country.
- Support the work of mission co-workers who are the hands and feet of Christ around the world. Jeff Boyd, mission coworker in DRC, tells us, "Even as we continue efforts to get the U.S. government to contribute meaningfully to alleviating the humanitarian crisis in the Congo, we continue to work with Presbyterian Disaster Assistance and PRODEK to implement a program for assisting hardest hit farming families to restart their activities, the production of food for their families and the community." Give to Presbyterian Disaster Assistance.
- Pray with those struggling for stability, for their family's safety, health, food, home and livelihoods. The following prayer is by the director of PC(USA) World Mission, Jose Luis Casal.

Immigrants' Creed

A prayer in solidarity with immigrant brothers and sisters

- I believe in almighty God, who guided [God's] people in exile and in exodus, the God of Joseph in Egypt and of Daniel in Babylon, the God of foreigners and immigrants.
- I believe in Jesus Christ, a displaced Galilean, who was born away from his people and his home, who had to flee the country with his parents when his life was in danger, and who upon returning to his own country had to suffer the oppression of the tyrant Pontius Pilate, the servant of a foreign power. He was persecuted, beaten, tortured and finally accused and condemned to death unjustly. But on the third day, this scorned Jesus rose from the death, not as a foreigner but to offer us citizenship in heaven.
- I believe in the Holy Spirit, the eternal immigrant from God's kingdom among us, who speaks all languages, lives in all countries and reunites all races.
- I believe that the church is the secure home for all foreigners and believers who constitute it, who speaks the same language and have the same purpose.
- I believe that the communion of saints begins when we accept the diversity of the saints.
- I believe in the forgiveness, which makes us all equal, and in the reconciliation, which identifies us more than does race, language or nationality.
- I believe that in the Resurrection, God will unite us as one people in which all are distinct and all are alike at the same time.
- I believe in the eternal life beyond this world, where no one will be an immigrant but all will be citizens of God's Kingdom that has no end. Amen.

Working for Justice and Peace

Advocacy for women at the international level By Sue Rheem, Presbyterian Ministry at the UN

The 62nd Commission on the Status of Women (CSW) drew to a close on March 23. More than 4,300 delegates from across the world gathered to advocate for the plight of rural women and girls. I got a firsthand experience as the Presbyterian Ministry at the United Nations hosted the Presbyterian delegation of 18 remarkable women. They attended over 100 events with UN officials, Member States, and civil society, advocating in areas of climate change, food sovereignty, transportation, access to education, health care, sexual and reproductive rights, and empowerment in governance—with the end goal of taking information back to their communities about what they learned to improve

the lives of rural women and girls. Hearing many of the stories was heartbreaking. The challenges women and their families face are daunting, yet to witness their resilience gave many of us the strength to continue this work of justice. Worshiping together each morning with our sisters and brothers in the faith community nourished us for the journey. We know that we are not alone, that

we have one another, and we will be all right knowing that God is with us on this journey.

General Assembly

Presbyterian Women at the General Assembly

The PC(USA)'s 223d General Assembly will meet June 16–23 in St. Louis, Missouri, and Presbyterian Women will be there. PW will have an exhibit in the exhibit hall, which will be staffed by PW staff and volunteers from the Giddings-Lovejoy Presbytery. If you will be at GA and would like to volunteer in the booth, please contact PW marketing associate Carissa Herold, carissa.herold @pcusa.org, for information.

For the first time, PW will be present at GA as a corresponding member to the assembly. Carol Winker will be the first national PW moderator to serve in this role. Corresponding members have voice but not vote. Commissioners voted PW's membership during the 222nd GA in 2016, along with placement in the Organization for Mission, the manual of administrative operations for the General Assembly, as a related corporation.

During this assembly, the Institutional Relationship Agreement between Presbyterian Women in the PC(USA), Inc., and the Presbyterian Mission Agency of the PC(USA) will be renewed. This agreement, originally known as a covenant, is renewed every four years. The covenant outlines how PW and the Presbyterian Mission Agency partner in the ministry and mission of the church. The covenant will be discussed in GA Committee 10, the Mission Coordination Committee, of the assembly.

PW will also pay close attention to the work of GA Committee 4, the Way Forward Committee. This committee will consider the recommendations of the Way Forward Commission, a group created by the 2016 General Assembly to review the structure of the PC(USA). Along with the All Agency Review Committee, a group assigned to periodically review the six agencies of the PC(USA),* the Way Forward Committee is recommending that the corporate functions of the Presbyterian Mission Agency Board (PMAB) be moved to a new corporate board specifically designed to manage corporate matters for the Presbyterian Mission Agency (PMA) and the Office of the General Assembly (OGA). Historically, corporate functions for PMA and OGA have been a responsibility of PMAB and its predecessor councils. According to Way Forward and All Agency, this change will allow PMAB to focus on mission and provide for a better corporate decisionmaking balance between OGA and PMA.

PW sits with voice and vote on PMAB. With corporate functions currently in PMAB, PW has voice and vote in these matters. PMAB's corporate work includes shared services—those services provided by PMAB that are used by other entities and agencies at the Presbyterian Center in Louisville (legal services, human resources, IT, finance and accounting, and so on). PW is the second largest user of shared services, and has benefitted from voice and vote in corporate decisions. In the original recommendation from Way Forward and All Agency, PW was not given a seat on the proposed new corporate board. After many conversations and debates related to board seats, this recommendation is now altered to include PW.

As the Way Forward Committee discusses the Way Forward Commission recommendations, PW leadership will pay close attention to the status of PW's decision-making seat on the proposed corporate board, as well as other matters moving through the assembly that impact the status of the organization and its purpose. What can you do? Here are some action steps:

- Pray for the commissioners to General Assembly.
- Be aware of congregation, presbytery, synod and national policies and actions—ask who is making decisions and what the impact on women will be.
- Log on to PC-Biz, the General Assembly web page that lists all of the business coming to GA. Pay attention to business that impacts women (For example, social justice issues are in Committee 11, where the Advocacy Committee for Women's Concerns has a resolution on sexual misconduct and one on

disparities experienced by black women and girls.) Create an account if you do not already have one: www.pc-biz.org/#/.

- Watch for Presbyterian News Service (www.pcusa.org/news/) and Presbyterian Outlook (pres-outlook.org) articles about issues coming before the Assembly. You can subscribe to PNS news feeds that will come to your email account.
- Watch for e-blasts from national PW in your email. If you do not subscribe to PW email information, contact Patricia Longfellow atpatricia.longfellow@pcusa.org
- Talk to commissioners in your presbytery and synod about actions coming before GA and tell them your concerns.
- Sign up for the GA223 newspaper at https://ga-pcusa.org/ #Anchor-EmailSignup.



Application for participation • July 12–22, 2019



A group of Presbyterian women will travel to the Finger Lakes Region of New York for the fifth USA Mission Experience. They will explore the rich history that Presbyterian women have in the women's and civil rights movements. These women will also have the opportunity to learn more about themselves and about some of the issues that confront the people of the Finger Lakes Region, including migrant workers and Native Americans.

Highlights of the journey will include a day in Seneca Falls at the Women's Convention at the National Women's Hall of Fame; a visit to the Susan B. Anthony home; and a visit to the Harriet Tubman House.

The USA Mission Experience equips women with an understanding of the region's history and culture, the existing ministry of the church there and the challenges faced by women and children living in the area. Participants serve as ambassadors for the region during two years of itineration following the experience.
