## About the Thank Offering

The Thank Offering began in 1888 when Eliza Clokey of Springfield, Ohio, urged each woman to give one dollar over and above her usual contribution to the Women's General Missionary Society of the United Presbyterian Church of North America. Since 1988, Presbyterian Women has supported more than 1,600 different projects, with grants of \$12.4 million for international and \$14.8 million for domestic projects.

It has been nearly 125 years since Eliza asked women to support mission and today faithful givers are still responding to her inspiring call through the PW Thank Offering.

Jim Bob Rutlin can  
finally rest easy at night.

Finding safe, affordable and adequate housing is a common problem for the deaf, blind and deafblind community. Jim Bob Rutlin, who was born blind, can tell you all about that. Prior to moving to Union Village, he lived in an unsafe motel. But he found a solution in Union Village, an innovative program by Presbyterian Home for Children in partnership with Alabama Institute for Deaf and Blind. Jim Bob became the first resident of Union Village’s tiny home community and its biggest cheerleader. With its thoughtfully designed floorplan and included maintenance services, Union Village has become a safe haven. “I’d rather live here than anywhere else. It’s the next best thing to heaven,” he says.

Once fully completed, Union Village will consist of 42 tiny homes that provide special accommodations and accessibility. The housing, while still affordable, provides income for the Presbyterian Home for Children. Each tiny home provides rental income that helps to fund caring for children as well as provide supportive housing for PHFC’s deaf, blind, deafblind, and multi-disabled community members.
