



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About the 2024 PW Churchwide Gathering

Held every three years, Presbyterian Women's Churchwide Gathering is an event that celebrates and can deepen your engagement in all that Presbyterian Women does. Participants enjoy workshops, tours, forums, resource gathering (and shopping!), plenary sessions with inspiring speakers, worship, music and more. You will also find opportunities to connect with other PWs from your synod and throughout the church in a variety of settings.

In 2021 the Gathering was held online due to the pandemic, but 2024 marks a return to an in-person event. Additionally, registrants will have the option to participate in parts of the event online—yet another first for the Churchwide Gathering!

The 2024 Gathering will be held in St. Louis, August 8–11, 2024. The Gathering will begin with dinner on Thursday, August 8, and concludes with morning worship on Sunday, August 11. Sleeping rooms, the exhibit hall, workshops, meals and bookstore will be at the Marriott St. Louis Grand. Plenary sessions will be held just across the street at America's Center Convention Complex.

Attending the Gathering in St. Louis means you will be part of the PW community—hugs and all! You'll have opportunities to connect with PW participants from across the country and to share the ministries, resources and priorities that shape your participation in PW. You can participate in up to six workshops of your choice, as well as work in shopping, education, book discussions and more. You'll be cared for, challenged, inspired and equipped to "do everything in love," a perfect theme to bring Presbyterian Women back together under one roof again.

Attending the Gathering online means you'll benefit from the insights of bold, faithful plenary and worship leaders who will reflect on what it means to care for ourselves, one another and all of creation. You'll have access to select workshops that highlight PW's commitments to Bible study, mission, justice and peace, leadership and inclusive community.

Registration Options

Gathering registration will be available at presbyterianwomen.org/gathering, March 1–July 7, 2024. Know that by registering early, you'll have the fullest selections of workshops (which can fill up), the option to purchase a Gathering tote bag (which sold out in 2018) and if you register by May 1, you'll receive the early registration incentives!

After July 7, you may register on site at the Marriott St. Louis Grand.

Note: Breakfast is on your own each day. Lunch is provided on Friday; dinner is provided on Thursday and Saturday. You may specify dietary preferences and allergies when you register for the Gathering.

All attendees (including voting reps) should register online.

Three registration options are available something for everyone!

Full registrant, \$450

It's the event you've been waiting years to attend an in-person Churchwide Gathering of Presbyterian Women. Come to St. Louis for this triennial event that begins with dinner on Thursday, August 8 and ends with morning worship on Sunday, August 11. A full registration is your ticket to community, learning and worship with PW siblings from across the country, workshops from inspiring leaders, shopping, a program book, three provided meals, book groups, opportunities for spiritual development and the incomparable energy of more than 1,000 PWs gathering to "do everything in love."

Single-day registrant (one-day limit), \$150

Enjoy the day's plenary sessions, provided meal of the day and select from the day's programming options. Attend up to three workshops (Friday or Saturday only), receive a program book, visit the exhibit hall, bookstore and silent auction, and/or join a book group!

Online registrant, \$150

Slide up to your computer (or grab your smart phone!) to take in the large-group plenary sessions, worship and select workshops.

Financial Assistance

A limited number of Gathering scholarships are available to cover the cost of a full/in-person Gathering registration. The deadline for applying is May 1, 2024, but early application is encouraged. Voting representatives, current PW, Inc. Board members and PW leadership development grant recipients from the last 36 months are not eligible to apply. 

Thursday Evening, August 8

The Gathering will include four plenary sessions with inspiring speakers and beautiful music from singer Allanda Small and pianist Phillip Morgan. The plenaries feature speakers representing a variety of backgrounds and calls to ministry. Together, they invite participants to consider new, faithful ways of doing everything in love.

The opening plenary introduces the Gathering theme by asking "What's Love Got to Do With It?" Leaders will reframe love as not just an emotion, but a gift and commandment from God. Rev. Cindy Kohlmann, who has served in two congregations, three presbyteries, and as co-moderator of the 223rd General Assembly, will give the keynote address.

Friday Morning, August 9

"Loving Our World" invites us to consider how we care for God's beautiful creation. Rev. Dr. Patricia K. Tull will introduce her newest study for Presbyterian Women, the 2024–2025 PW/Horizons Bible study, *Let Justice Roll Down: God's Call to Care for Neighbors and All Creation*. The keynote speaker is Rev. Yung Me Suh Morris, who will reflect on what it means to love our world from her experiences pastoring congregations and in chaplaincy with the unhoused.

Friday Evening, August 9

Presbyterian Women has long embodied this plenary session theme—"Loving Our Neighbors," through advocacy, mission, prayer and loving care for God's children. Rev. Evelyn Torres, a bivocational pastor from Puerto Rico whose congregation received a 2022 Birthday Offering grant, is the keynote speaker. Rev. Dr. Rhashell Hunter will introduce the 2025–2026 PW/*Horizons* Bible study she is writing—*Celebrating Our Resilience and Joy in Jesus Christ*.

Saturday Morning, August 10

"Loving Ourselves" is the theme for the morning plenary, and Rev. Laura Mariko Cheifetz will examine the social and personal identities that shape our experience in the world and celebrate God's love for all of us—not in spite of these differences but in celebration of them. Dr. Veda Pendleton will give a preview of themes and inspiration for the 2026–2027 PW/Horizons Bible study she is writing, Love as Equity in the Body of Christ.

Saturday Evening, August 10

In a Gathering themed "Do Everything in Love," of course programming will include a time for Presbyterian women to connect with each other and celebrate all that Presbyterian Women is, can be and makes possible!

Sunday Morning: Loving Out Loud

Rev. CeCe Armstrong, a cradle Presbyterian who now proudly serves as the associate pastor of St. James on James Island in Charleston, South Carolina, will preach and preside at the table for this worship service. This joyous closing will inspire participants to be courageous and bold in loving God, creation, neighbor and self—the perfect way to end the Gathering, embodying the daily theme "Loving Out Loud"!

Environmental justice—healing ecological damage that harms neighbors—occupies the overlapping space between social justice and earth care. This workshop will introduce the 2024–2025 PW/Horizons Bible study that examines scriptural, theological and ethical dimensions of environmental justice. The study invites participants to ponder fair use of land, food, water and air; climate justice for neighbors and descendants; and the mended world we long to see.

Rev. Dr. Patricia K. Tull is A.B. Rhodes Professor Emerita of Hebrew Bible at Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary, author of the 2024–2025 PW/Horizons Bible study and the 2001–2002 PW/Horizons Bible study Esther's Feast.

We have come through a difficult period, with the pandemic, changes in worship and/or work environments and many other uncertainties. Our churches, organizations and we ourselves may never be the same again. How do we find and celebrate our resilience and joy in the midst of stressful life circumstances? Let's explore this together, acknowledging that our identity is found in Christ Jesus.

Rev. Dr. Rhashell Hunter is author of the 2025–2026 *PW/Horizons Bible study and "Celebrate the Gifts of*

Women" for multiple years. She teaches polity at Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary, and served as director of Racial Equity & Women's Intercultural Ministries for 14 years.

2026–2027 PW/Horizons Bible Study, Love as Equity in the Body of Christ— Veda Pendleton

In this workshop we will explore terms such as diversity, equity, inclusion, and belonging and what their definitions signify for the body of Christ. We will examine why these terms are important for Christians and what they mean we should do on a daily basis as followers of Jesus Christ. Abolishing Cages: Journey to Community— Deborah Lee

Offered twice: Friday, 10:30 AM and 4 PM

The Interfaith Movement for Human Integrity is engaging communities of faith in the movement to close prisons and detention centers, and create thriving communities based in racial equity and community care. What is the spiritual foundation for this work? And what is the unique role communities of faith can play in abolition and ending harm? **Rev. Deborah Lee** is the executive director of the Interfaith Movement for Human Integrity (IM4HI) in California, a network of people of faith who accompany people impacted by deportation, detention and incarceration. She has worked at the intersection of faith and social justice for more than 30 years.

Amazing Things To Do with Congregational Green Teams—Patricia K. Tull Offered twice: Saturday, 2:15 and 4 PM

In this workshop based on years of experience with Indiana's first Earth Care Congregation in Jeffersonville—installing solar panels, increasing energy

efficiency, founding a tree nursery in Kenya, educating members, and much more—as well as working with many other congregations through Interfaith Power & Light and Patricia's ecological writings, participants will learn about new opportunities presented by ever-increasing awareness of climate change and by new tax credits available to churches.

Rev. Dr. Patricia K. Tull is A.B. Rhodes Professor Emerita of Hebrew Bible at Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary, author of two PW/Horizons Bible studies and Inhabiting Eden: Christians, the Bible, and the Ecological Crisis.

Best Practices for Saving and Sharing PW History Offered twice: Saturday, 10:30 AM and 2:15 PM

This workshop focuses on best practices for preserving PW records and sharing PW history. We'll cover what to keep, what to share, where to send materials, and what to do with records when a PW group is disbanding.

- Silent Auction Mentor: The Silent Auction Mentor (SAM) is placed in the resource room where the PW Silent Auction is located. SAMs assist in helping those who are interested in placing a bid on any of the items. SAMs answer questions about the silent auction procedure and how a bid is placed. SAMs oversee that all information needed from the bidder is completed.

Most volunteer roles will have little to no impact on your participation in Gathering programming. We will contact you by email to schedule your volunteer roles and to answer any questions or concerns you might have.

During registration, simply click the box for volunteer and select the role(s) you would like to fill. All are welcome to volunteer in St. Louis, where we will gather to "Do everything in love"!

Period Products and Menstrual Justice

Of the roughly 800,000,000 people menstruating on a given day, 500,000,000 do not have the basic supplies, information or support to manage their period.* That sobering figure represents not just women and girls, but also trans and nonbinary individuals in every country around the world. Beyond the stigma of menstruation, menstrual supplies generally are not available as basic necessities in public restrooms like toilet paper or paper towels. Simply put, just as many people turn to food pantries to fill gaps in their families' meals, they also need pads and tampons to keep them from missing out on life due to their period.

Until policies change, help fill this need by bringing boxes of pads or tampons to the Gathering. Life-Wise STL—a St. Louis organization that helps individuals achieve well-being by addressing systemic barriers—will receive the donated supplies and provide them to people who need them.

Racial Equity Dialogue (RED) Training August 7, 2024

One of the most powerful ways Presbyterian Women lives out our commitment to "building an inclusive, caring community of women" is when individual Presbyterian women seek to understand how race impacts our experiences in the world. PW in the Synod of the Mid-Atlantic established a Racial Equity Dialogue (RED) team in 2007. Since that time, the team has coordinated multiple opportunities to learn about and discuss race, helping to build relationships among and between individuals from different racial backgrounds.

On August 7, 8 AM-4 PM, Catrelia Hunter and Nina Khoury—from the Synod of the Mid-Atlantic's RED team—will lead a training on how PW in the Synods can establish and coordinate a RED team. Each synod may send two representatives, who are willing to commit for three years (Churchwide Gathering to Churchwide Gathering) to start, reignite or continue a RED team in their respective synods.

Disaster Preparedness Training

August 7–8, 2024

Are you called to the ministry of disaster response? This specialized ministry helps ensure that presbyteries and congregations have basic plans and preparedness in the event of church emergency or direct hit by disaster—natural, human-caused or industrial-technical.

Once again, Presbyterian Disaster Assistance's Presbyterian Women Preparedness Training Team will present a two-day pre-conference event for Presbyterian women who are interested in being trained to help presbyteries and congregations in their area develop preparedness plans to reduce the chaos that occurs during a disaster. The 8-hour training will take place in the afternoon of August 7 and the morning of August 8. Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) will cover food and lodging costs for the training (two nights in a hotel and three meals) for full registrants of the Gathering. The training will end with a commissioning and certification for those who complete the training as a PW Disaster Preparedness Trainer.

Requirements for trainers include:

- Interest in disaster preparedness
- Three-year commitment to actively seek, set-up, and conduct at least three disaster preparation trainings per year in congregations, clusters and/or presbytery/presbyteries
- Presentation experience
- Comfortable in using email and PowerPoint presentations
- Completed application and three references

Business Meeting

August 7–8, 2024

The Triennial Business Meeting of Presbyterian Women in the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), Inc., will convene in person at 7:00 PM on Wednesday, August 7, and conclude on August 8, before the Churchwide Gathering opens. The Business Meeting is open to observers; however, only certified voting representatives may vote. Voting representatives must be physically present at the meeting; online participation is not available.

Moderators of PW in the Presbytery (PWP) and PW in the Synod (PWS) have already submitted the names of their voting representatives, and the certification process is under way. If you have questions about the voting representative for your presbytery or synod, contact your PWP or PWS moderator.

In mid-April 2024, voting representatives will receive an email with a link to register for the Business Meeting and the option to also register for the Gathering. Each voting representative will receive a unique link. The sending body (PWP or PWS) may choose to cover the Churchwide Gathering registration fee and/or other Gathering expenses for each of its voting representatives.

Housing

All Gathering sleeping rooms are at the

Marriott St. Louis Grand 800 Washington Avenue St. Louis, MO 63101

Rooms start at \$185 per night, one to four persons per room, plus taxes and fees. These discounted rates will apply three nights before and after the Gathering. Attendees are responsible for making their own hotel reservation. Only one person per hotel room should reserve a room, but should provide the names of others who will occupy that room.

Many websites offer hotel bookings, but to ensure a legitimate booking at the Gathering rate, reserve your room via:

- the hotel booking link at the end of your Gathering registration confirmation
- a call to 877/303-0104—the Marriott reservation line (To access the group rate, request the "Churchwide Gathering of Presbyterian Women 2024 Room Block." You may also use your Marriott points to reserve your room via this phone number.)

Cancellation of an individual reservation must be made 48 hours in advance of the arrival date.

Failure to notify the hotel will result in a charge of one night's room rate, plus applicable state and local taxes.

Acknowledgements will be sent after each housing booking, modification and/or cancellation. If you do not receive an acknowledgement, contact the Marriott.

Parking is \$20 per day per vehicle at the Marriott St. Louis Grand.

Transportation

St. Louis's largest airport is St. Louis Lambert International Airport, and there are multiple ways to get from the airport to the hotel.

- MetroLink, St. Louis's light rail system stops only one block from the Marriott St. Louis Grand. The 45-minute (traffic-free) ride to the hotel from St. Louis Lambert International Airport costs between \$2.50 and \$5.
- Lyft and Uber (ride-share apps) are widely available. Prices start at \$35 for a ride from St. Louis Lambert International Airport to the Marriott St. Louis Grand.
- Taxis (such as St. Louis County Cab) will be available at the airport. Fares begin at \$47 for a ride from St. Louis Lambert International Airport to the Marriott St. Louis Grand.



To "offset" the carbon emissions involved in traveling to the Gathering, you will have the option to add a \$12 carbon offset to your Gathering registration. These offsets are way to join the PC(USA) efforts in planting trees and supporting other carbon sequestration projects in the U.S. and around the world, as part of our stewardship of God's creation. Together, our collective donations to the Presbyterian Tree Fund/Restoring Creation account will support tree-planting and other climate-friendly grants.
